Maurice Willows was the last hero I found, and when I read about him, I got ideas instantly and the subject was very fascinating to me. I remember learning about the Tulsa Race Massacre a while back, but I never learned about Willows, and it only made me more curious about who he was and what he did. After I read a little about him, I was extremely interested, I read about all the remarkable things he did and how he aided and put the effort into supporting the poor victims of the tragedy. My research first started on previous Lowell Milken winners and other projects on Maurice Willows. I found a documentary about him from a previous Lowell Milken project, it helped tremendously. I included some Red Cross members carrying a stretcher. I also added imagery of Tulsa and the destruction caused to make clear how terrible it was, all of this over the color of skin. I learned a lot about not only what the Red Cross did, but what Tulsa was like before and how strong the community was. The community of Greenwood and the Black Wall Street was very enchanting to learn about, it was an emotional topic to research when you learn about how it was destroyed, a rich community just eliminated. But learning about this makes me only want to know more, and to dig deeper into topics like these.

After this project, I have come to minutely understand the importance of history, the importance of the people and I feel like unsung heroes like Maurice Willows deserve recognition. When I was researching Willows, I only found a single photo of him. To me, that emphasized him being an unsung hero and he is just an amazing person for what he did. I enjoyed talking about Willows, and most people who knew of the event, none knew about him. I even talked to my old teacher who taught me about the Tulsa Race Massacre, and she did not know of him either.
