Unsung Hero: Irena Sendler

"My parents taught me that if a man is drowning, it is irrelevant what his religion or nationality is. One must help him." This is a quote from Irena Sendler, one woman who went out of her way to save the Jewish children who were being held in the Warsaw Ghetto from 1942-1943. Irena saved a total of 2500 children from this ghetto, not seeking anything in return. Whilst saving the children she put the children into new homes and gave them new names, she wrote down these new identities and their Jewish names on slips of paper, put them in jars and buried them underground so when the time came, they could be given their identities back.

I was really drawn to this particular Unsung hero after watching the video of the 4 students who went looking for Ms. Sendler, while watching her story i felt really encouraged how she put her life at risk and had the ability to rescue over 2,000 children on her own and at her size with no one even telling her to do so.
