L. Alex Wilson is my "Unsung Hero", because he was a victim involved in the story of the Little Rock Nine. The Little Rock Nine is what they called a group of African American students at an all-white school named Little Rock Central. He had the height of 6'3" and was born 1909. At the school he was really noticeable because of how tall and well-dressed he was, and he got chased and brutally beaten by an angry white mob.
