I discovered the hero, Kendall Reinhardt, through the Lowell Milken Center for Unsung Heroes website. As I scrolled through the list of unsung heroes, Reinhardt stuck out to me, because of the courage he possessed at such a young age. High school is a time when you are developing into who you want to be with influences from your educators and your peers. As a senior in high school during a period of racial tension, Kendall decided who he wanted to be by standing outside of the crowd and showing kindness to those who needed it the most.

In 1957, the peak of America's Civil Rights movement, nine African American students were enrolled in Little Rock Central High School, an all-white school in Arkansas. Despite the Brown vs. Board of Education decision, which declared segregation in schools unconstitutional, segregationists were not in favor of the news and rallied for change. The Little Rock Nine struggled to make it through those doors, and once they did, they faced verbal and physical abuse from their white peers. However, one white student in particular chose to value morality over popularity: Kendall Reinhardt. Ken became a loyal friend to the Little Rock Nine, including Elizabeth Eckford. As he walked in the light, he faced bullies and threats along with his father who received vile phone calls from those that held hatred for Ken's empathy. No matter what he came across, Kendall stuck to his beliefs and tried his best to create a more welcoming atmosphere for the Little Rock Nine in school. As I read more and more about his story, I thought about how I could bring that bravery into a piece of artwork. I chose to illustrate a hallway of Little Rock Central High School, in which in the center Kendall Reinhardt walks with Elizabeth Eckford and another one of the Little Rock Nine. On the outskirts of the canvas, stand several white peers staring at the three with angry expressions. The hallway is sketched, and the peers are all-white cartoon figures, because of their belief in the absence of color. In the middle, bright colors burst from the three who are painted realistically, originating from the audacity and authenticity Kendall possesses. In a sea of white, he dives with the mindset to make a difference, treating those hated with enduring kindness. His courage shall always be remembered.

Through this project, I have learned how important it is to celebrate heroes, even if they are not recognized in the books. Heroes not only create a positive impact in the past or in the present, but in the future as well. Their legacy shall carry on through generations, as they provide an example of what it means to be selfless and courageous. I am thankful to have had the opportunity to meet the hero, Kendall Reinhardt, by learning about his story.
