To me this woman was Kadambini Ganguly.

Kadambini Ganguly's perseverance is how she ended being the 1st in so many ways. In 1861, Kadambini was born into an Indian culture that did not value the education of women. But thanks to the influence of her father, who was a co-founder of the 1st women's rights organization and a headmaster, she was granted the opportunity to go to school. She ended up being the 1st woman to pass the entrance exam and 1st woman to graduate college in India (with Chandramukhi Basuln). When she 1st applied for her medical degree, she was rejected. After a long fight, she finally was accepted to Calcutta Medical College and became the 1st Indian-educated female dr. She continued to fight to be accepted as a legitimate doctor, even going to court to fight the slander. Her fight even gave her another 1st as a representative in the 1st female delegation of the Indian Congress. The story of how Kadambini Ganguly fought hard for her chance to go to medical university and continued to not take no for an answer, is what stood out to me the most. I chose Kadambini Ganguly because her being the first Indianeducated female doctor gives off that sense of pride and confidence. It was very difficult for females to move up in society due to the comparison between male superiority and female superiority.
