Emma then started to establish homes and schools for some 3000 refugee children in Corinth, Greece. But in the beginning she would rescue the orphaned children and hide them in safe homes and basements. But eventually she ran out of hiding places for them, so she then placed thousands of them in the hospital she was overseeing. This hospital eventually became an orphanage, I personally wouldn't say "orphanage" I would say sanctuary where these children were cared for and loved by Emma. A real hero is someone who fights for what they believe in and does what is right. Emma put herself last and those orphaned children and others first. She gave the children and others she rescued a second chance at life, to be able to live without wondering where they will sleep that night, or what they will eat, or even when their next meal will be.
