The load on TOSH staff and volunteers has been particularly heavy.

Final results from the membership enhancement are not in yet, but we have been delighted and warmed by many of the responses. We have new Lifetime Friends, and our corporate membership drive is going well. Many people have enhanced their membership and many others have promised to do so. As with the information teas, this has been an opportunity to receive feedback from members, which is so valuable.

The Town of Qualicum Beach has accepted our proposal for the lease of Valhalla, with some qualifications which are in the process of being resolved. We have plans for some uses of the building and will be offering it to other community groups for regular or occasional rental. This resource will help us to overcome space constraints at The Old School House.

Director Ruth Seburn organized the event which included musical entertainment by Larry Stubbins and Rosalee Duncan.

FROM THE ADMINISTRATOR

I would like to express my personal appreciation for the effort put into the Membership Enhancement Program by our teams of volunteers, and the special effort by Margot Cyr and Bert Cafik to gain the support of many Qualicum Beach businesses. Director Paul O'Connor is working in a similar fashion in Parksville. It has been deeply satisfying to co-operate with many of these proprietors in a team approach to attract visitors, while at the same time creating a vigorous community spirit to be enjoyed by our own residents. We sincerely welcome these new supporters and look forward to welcoming those who will join our growing list in the future.

It is important for everyone in our district to recognize some significant facts about TOSH. WE DO NOT RECEIVE FUNDING FOR ADMINSTRATIVE COSTS FROM ANY OF THE THREE LEVELS OF GOVERNMENT!! We knew TOSH was unique. Where else will you find two galleries (the Brown and the Mini-gallery) a gallery giftshop, classroom facilities and working artists studios all housed in a heritage building? But where else would you find a facility with all of the foregoing AND one that manages to raise its own funds from a supportive community which includes artists, businesses, volunteers, and those who just enjoy having a vibrant cultural facility so close to home?

Why haven't we had government support? Because you need a track record before you can be considered. As a fledgling art centre we did not qualify. We have established a track record just in time to see governments finally get the message from Canadian taxpapers that they are rebelling against deficit spending. Although we have not received administrative funding, we have enjoyed assistance through student employment programs. This year will be our first without a student to help ease the pressure on our volunteers for a few weeks over the summer, especially in regard to summer Sunday openings.

Isn't it invigorating to see what we have accomplished? Perhaps by necessity TOSH was ahead of its time. Perhaps we are a forerunner of what will be expected in the future. AND we are in great company! The Art Gallery of Greater Victoria raises 52% of its operating costs, unheard of for a major gallery. This philosophy for the 90s was rewarded when benefactor Eric Charman saw fit to gift AGGV and TOSH with part of the funds awarded to him by the Council for Business and the Arts in Canada.


