



ust a few of my observations:

The best advertising is interesting press releases with interviews and photos. I question the use of posters but thought the handbills a good idea. The phone blitz seemed to produce results. The least effective advertising seems to be paid ads. We could have emphasized the fund-raising aspect more.

Our best returns on hampers seems to be during times of high volumn traffic at the Schoolhouse; the Christmas Showcase for example. The on-the-spot raffles were a hugh success, not just financially, but added an element of chance and fun to the event.

Over-all it was an excellent event right from the start with such a talented team working so well together and having lots of fun doing it. The decor, the music the food, and the upbeat atmosphere all came together so well.
