"Explorations"

A solo exhibit by **William Allsister**, Artist, Author and Film Maker.

Brown Gallery, August 28 -September 26

After joining the Canadian army and fighting in Hong Kong, William Allister found himself languishing in Japanese prisoner-of-war camps in Japan and China from 1941 - 1945. The influence and sometimes brutal experience of these years in the orient were to have a marked effect on his work as an artist.

Married in 1946, he moved to Hollywood and pursued a career in art, film and literature. His first novel "A Handful of Rice" won him first prize for literature in 1961. He has also won nine international firsts for his work in documentary films.

In 1962, he moved with his family to San Miguel, Mexico where he began to devote his career to painting. He has held 16 one-man shows to date.

After a 38 year absence, he returned to Japan in 1983 to purge some demons from the past. He and his wife stayed in Kyoto for an extended period studying Japanese art and

culture. It was during this period that he was motivated to create a unique series of paintings that blended Japanese images and Western forms; and original marriage of East and West.

These works were hung in the Canadian Embassy in Tokyo and have since been exhibited in several major galleries in Canada. Allister's work appears in collections around the world.

Exhibitions take on a new warmth and style

TOSH Lifetime member, Joan Craig, who lives in Halifax is currently in town and dropped by to tell us about an exhibition of the work of Maud Lewis.

Maud Lewis (1903 - 1970) was born in Digby NS and during her entire life never journeyed further away than an hour by car. Little did she know that despite many handicaps, her work would touch the hearts of thousand in Canada and around the world. The innocent and colourful celebration of the life that is Maud's work is on display at The Art Gallery of Greater Victoria from August 7 - October 20.

Educational programs at TOSH

The Old School House Public Gallery and Art Learning Centre takes the latter part of its title very seriously. An important role is to provide education and fun in a wide variety of arts and crafts to all who may wish to participate from kids to seniors.

Children can paint, make pottery and enjoy a variety of craft activities throughout the school year on Tuesdays and Thursdays after school and some Saturday mornings. Summer workshops for children have been ongoing and fully booked this past July. Also, this past year Denise Mottle has provided an 8 week curriculum of classes for K to Grade 6, and Grade 7 -12 for the District 69 Home School Program; and Pauline Pike gave an afternoon workshop for the Springwood Gifted Students Program.

suitable for everyone from beginners to those with more experience. Day and evening courses run for 8 weeks from Monday to Thursday in acrylics, oils, watercolours, pastels, drawing and pottery. This Summer has seen a number of workshops by visiting artists: Kiff Holland, Joyce Kamikura and Bruce Cryer.

A new feature this Fall will be a series of weekend and one day workshops for those unable to attend regularly or for specific projects. One of the day courses will be the return of Simon Yan who provides the unique opportunity to learn to make a willow chair which is yours at the end of the day!

Bryan Stafford Smith

As the recently appointed coordinator for the education program at The Old School House, Bryan Stafford-Smith is no newcomer to the world of teaching and learning. Bryan and his wife, Betty, retired to this community in 1995 from Montreal where, for the

previous 20 years, he had been a Professor of Civil Engineering at McGill University. His teaching experience began in 1952 when, for three years as an Instructor Lieutenant in the Royal Navy, he taught sailors, from Technicians to Admirals, the electronics of newly introduced GCA (Ground Controlled Approach) system for aircraft. After the Navy Bryan returned to his original field of civil engineering to practice for three years in structural design, before joining Bristol University in 1959 to begin a 36 year career of teaching and research in engineering. In 1975, Bryan, his wife and three children moved to Canada, to his post at McGill. In addition to a B.Sc. in Engineering, Bryan holds Doctor of Philosophy and Doctor of Science degrees.

Over the years, Bryan has taken occasional courses in oil and Watercolour painting and, since coming to Qualicum, has attended Pauline Pike's courses in oils, and two summer workshops at TOSH. Although by profession a "non-arts" person, he brings to his post at TOSH a strong interest and belief in arts education. For all stages of life, from childhood through retirement, art for the amateur can be an immense pleasure, enrich the imagination, and heighten ones visual appreciation of the daily world around us.
