Autherine Lucy Foster was the first African American woman to attend the University of Alabama. She excelled in education and delivered several speeches about her experience at the University of Alabama. I chose to focus on Lucy because she lived during the time of segregation, a crucial period in history. Lucy's strength and bravery has inspired me to select her as my subject for my competition piece. She took many risks despite the discrimination and opposition that she was facing. Something I admire about Lucy is her strong sense of determination, despite the hostility and discrimination. Her willingness to give many speeches shows the strength in her. Her legacy from the University has left a huge mark and significantly impacts society.

Autherine Lucy was a significant figure during the time of segregation. Her admission initiated intense protests and an abundance of hatred across cities.
