The true story of a WWII undercover teenager begins in Czechoslovakia, where, in a tiny rural area, one little girl named Agnes Lackovic, grew up as the fifth out of seven other children, where the family barely had enough money to feed themselves. Moreover, Agnes was a girl who was often sick, which created a major burden on the family. Due to her condition, she moved to live with her Aunt Rosa Schneider in Munich at the age of 10, where she attempted to help Agnes during her recovery. That was when her new life began.

Later, Rosa found a tutor so Agnes could learn German and start attending local school. When Rosa and her husband, Georg, quickly realized that Agnes was an extremely smart and hardworking girl, they decided to pull her out of school and hire tutors that would live with them for six months at a time in Italy so she could speak other languages. By age 14, along with her native Slovakian, she also knew German, French, and English. When she returned to Munich, Rosa began training her as a spy. Agnes began writing and passing codes to her allies. By then she was registered as an official spy with the U.S. government. Although her first code name was 3-6-9, she was very young to be an agent, and since there were very few agents her age, her aunt decided to add "KID" at the end. Years later, since Agnes couldn't stand to see people dying and suffering without a logical reason, Agnes and Aunt Rosa started helping the Jewish people imprisoned by the Nazis. Aunt Rosa would distract the Nazi guards while Agnes crept over to the prisoners and whispered a secret code in French to let them know that she was a secret agent and could help them. Through these courageous acts, Agnes

Lackovic made a major impact in WWII by helping many Jews in the concentration camps.

For my artwork, I opted to pick an ordinary photo of Agnes Lackovic as my reference. The reason was her lovely smile and beautiful face. I selected warm colors because of her warm personality, and I chose very colorful depictions due to her bringing life in color to a dark and scary situation as a caring, selfless, and courageous person with a big heart.
